On 02/13/07 Nik Nahikian said:

I was at "Estaca" from Aug 67 to Aug 68 This was an interesting year for me. My first isolated (restricted) assignment and a return to Spain after I had spent 1959 – 1962 in the Air Force acting as an adviser/instructor to the Spanish Air Force near Calatayud, Spain. When I reported aboard the CO was Ltjg O'Niell who was relieved by Ltjg Picone. EN1 'Red'Jarrett was the XPO, his replacement was EN1 J.V. Crowder. ET1 Bob Paul was senior tech and when he rotated in Mar '68 yours truly became the senior tech. When I departed ET2 R.A. Fisher took my place. For much of the time there we operated only part time, probably 12 hours a day, if I recall it was from 2000 hrs until 0800. This because the slave station (manned by the French Navy) was not wanting to transmit 24/7 and there was no use in having a master station on air all by its lonesome, During my tour I did about 80% of the mail runs to El Ferrol and about 60% of the log trips to La Caruna. The north coast of Spain was far more beautiful than the interior where I was stationed before.

Recently, An oil tanker called the Prestige sank off the coust of Spain leaving its legacy along all of the coast of Galicia. After walking the beach of Abrela outside Escourido, I was left with black feet. The only way to remove the sludge was with gas soaked rags. I was in Viveiro and talked with Victor for a bit. It was the first time that I had seen him since 91 and he seemed to be doing well. He hadn't changed a bit. I can't wait to go back in December.

Once again, I visited Galicia in Spain and have just returned. While at the Fiesta de Santiago in Viveiro I ran into one of our former workers, Antonio Lopez, Tony, and his wife. Tony was working for the Spanish Navy in O Ferrol (See my earlier comments) but is now retired and living in Villa de Vares. I also managed to drive out to the old base at Estaca, and nothing has changed, it continues to be a mess. However, the old semáforo station on top of the hill overlooking the base is a completely different story. It's now a hotel de naturaleza with five bedrooms, restaurant and bar. I got there just as it opened one morning and had a nice chat with the the management and staff. It is owned by the Town of Mañon but operated by a private company. It looks like a great place to stay and for sightseeing. As always the visit to Spain was terrific, despite the heat wave, which actually made it better for the beach, swimming, etc.

I just got back from another trip to Viveiro. Dave Scebbi (1974-76) was also there visiting with his wife Lolita and two daughters and niece, and he and I paid a visit to the base. It's worse than ever - dilapidated, crumbling, a mess. Nevertheless we toured the ruins and reminisced a lot about the place. The good news is that the old semáforo station at the top of the hill overlooking the base has been completely restored and should be open by now as a bar-restaurant (what else?!) and a casa rural, a kind of small country inn. Dave and I drove up the widened access road and the place looks terrific, the view breathtaking. People still talk about the base being restored and used for something else (retirement home, drug rehabilitation center were two suggestions I heard), but nothing is in the works. We then went to visit Felix at his home in Villa de Vares, but he was not there. Back in Viveiro I saw Victoriano Paz, the ex-cook, and we had a good chat. Other ex-Estaca hands in town were Greg Ziemer (1974-1977), Bob Scarborough (1971) and Leon Katcharian (1964-5). As always, a good time was had by all!

I just returned from a week in Viveiro (as it's now known, in Gallego). I ran into Victor Paz, the ex-cook from Estaca and we had a nice chat. Vic looks terrific - slimmer, tanned, etc., and he spends a lot of time doing errands for his family since his wife has been ill for some time. According to Victor, Tony from Bares is still working in O Ferrol for the Spanish Navy, and Felix is now retired and living in Bares. I was stationed at Estaca from Nov 78 - Dec 80. I was part of the second wave of Air Force. I also married while their and she's from Foz. I hope you guys don't mind an Air Force member adding his comments to your site. I try to go their when in the area. They set up a bunch of wind generators near the lighthouse. The site is fenced in and has been abandoned for quite awhile now. I had the room as you go up the steps turn right past the bathroom and the last room on your right. It had black walls, red ceiling and green carpets. Since I worked shift I would put a piece of cardboard on the window and it was nice and dark for sleeping. We had a black Lab who started getting epileptic fits and would bark at his own shadow. I later moved down to Baquero next to Pepe's (the taxi driver) house. I own a apartment in Foz that we bought about three years ago. I roads in the area have improved tremendously compared to when we were their. I remember once that it was fogging that you couldn't see the garage/generator building from the window in the chow hall. Plus the wind their was crazy. But those were two of the best years that I had. The seafood was great, the wine nice and the woman were pretty.

I served with Lt Katcharian and he married a gire from vivero(can't rember her name) and took her back to N.Y. Havent heard about him since. My Memeroy is shaded by too much vino.

Spent 64 and 65 at Estaca

On 04/08/00 Geoff Taylor said:

Some time in the mid Sixties I was in Vivero as an English teacher, working in my summer holidays with a Spanish family from Madrid who were on holiday there for a couple of weeks. I spent quite a few convivial evenings in the Casino there, drinking with the then C.O. Leon Z Katcharian, from New York, if I remember right, and some of the other guys. I've often wondered what became of him but never quite knew how to find out until now. Anybody help?

On 11/27/99 **Mike Rems** said:

At Estaca in 1961, I met and married my wife of 36 years in Vivero. Actually, I wangled a 'swap' to Naples and we were married there. Robert 'Foxy' Reynard was to CO. It was a great tour of duty, in a great part of Spain. I have been back several times. Last time, the base was abandaned' a rusty, crumbling group of buildings, with a fence around it to keep people out. Very sad if you remember it with the generators humming, and the loran transmitters idling, ten lonely guys trying to 'make it real'. I was the radioman, assigned to communicate with France by morsecode. A unique assignment you will agree. I welcome jerry302@comcast.netanyone who was there.

On 09/16/99 **CDR John A. Wcislo** said:

As I mentioned earlier, I have been back to Estaca a number of times over the past twenty years, so I thought I'd provide an update for anybody who checks in at this table. Estaca is now abandoned, vandalized and crumbling into the ground.

More on its fate later. The Air Force ran Estaca as a communications site from 1978 until 1991. I was a central player in the transfer, coordinating all of the Air Force logistics and engineering needs before they moved in. I even had a mixed Air Force - Coast Guard crew for the last two months of LORAN operations (AF loved it - they could grow beards!). When we shutthe signal off at midnight on January 1, 1978, we toasted with champagne and then headed down to Vivero to the discotheque to celebrate the NewYear. An interesting detail is that I stayed on for about a month afterwards, helping the Air Force in the transition. Around January 20, two gentlemen from La Coruña showed up at the station, asking what had happened to the LORAN signal. Apparently the Spanish Government failed to notify the users of the closure. As a result the fishing fleet in Galicia had to float test their LORAN A receivers! You all may remember the three Gallegos that worked at the station - Felix, Tony and Victor. They're all still alive. Felix is living in Bares withhis wife. His daughter, Maria Felix married an Air Force NCO back in 1981-82, and they are now stationed in Japan. We saw her two years ago in Covas. Victor is retired and I saw him around Vivero last summer. Tony took a job with the Spanish Navy in El Ferrol and does maintenance on the navy housing. When the Coast Guard left in 1978, we paid them all a severance, and then the Air Force re-hired them all plus 4more civilians. The problem arose when the Air Force pulled out. The original three's seniority clock was zeroed out in 1978 when the transfer was made and they were paid the severance and re-hired. If that hadn't happened they all could have retired in 1991. That's why Tony had to go to work in El Ferrol. Felix went on disability for some reason and Victor managed to go on unemployment until he was eligible to retire. The Air Force expanded the site during their 13-year stay, adding bedrooms, a gymnasium, a wet bar, more garage space, etc. You know how those guys are; they always had the bucks to spend. The lighthouse up the road is now automated but has a single keeper, a woman with a bunch of mutts. She works for the Captain of the Port of El Ferrol. Regarding the base itself. About two years ago the Concello de Mañon, the municipal government that covers Bares, decided to ask the Spanish Ministry of Defense for the facility. Defense then had to notify all the original landowners because under Spanish law, they or their heirs have to be given the opportunity to buy the property back, at market prices. The family that owned the majority of the land is dragging their feet because of a political spat and because they would like to get in on whatever the property is used for, like to set up a bar or something. Nothing has been resolved to date. Two years ago I had a conversation with a reporter from the Voz de Galicia about the base and about possibly doing a story on it. She was real interested, but by the time she got the paper to follow up we had already left Spain. I'll try to post more news as it develops.

On 02/21/98 John E. Foley said:

I served as the leading ET from July 73 through August 74. I was also the XPO. This was one of the best tours of my Coast Guard career which ended in retirement in 1992. I have not returned since I departed but hope to do so. I have wondered much about how Vic, Ma Ma, and the other Spanish workers might be. I miss thoses evenings in Bares and the taxi rides with Alfredo. I would like to hear from anyone who was there over the years. Anyone have any information about Herb Breiter? I releived him in 73.

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
