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## SURVEY OF CG LORSTA CATANDUANES

I The Cost of Living

- A. Officers The only regular outlay of money for the officer attached is his monthly mess bill, usually between 50 and 60 dollars. His only other expenses would be for various sundries from the canteen or for the purchase of souveniers from the natives. The souveniers are rather limited however, there being only Bolo knives, sea shells, straw hats and hammocks and acticles of like nature.
- B. Enlisted The only expenses for enlisted men would be for canteen items or for souveniers.
- II Recreational Facilities
  There is no distinction between officer and enlisted recreational
  facilities. Available are: Nightly movies, Billiards, Swimming year'round except for two months during the summer when the presence of
  jelly fish make it somewhat unpleasant; Hiking, limited Hunting and
  Fishing, Woodworking, Leathercraft, etc. Recently a concrete court
  was completed here giving excellent facilities for Basketball,
  Volleyball, Badminton, and Shuffleboard. Incidental hobby and
  recreational equipment requests are promptly handled by the District
  Office. On the whole, recreation facilities on this station are
  considered to be excellent.
- III Cost of Living Dependents No dependents authorized.
- The temperature here ranges between 95 during the day to 75 at night. Humidity is high year around but once one gets used to it the climate is very comfortable. The station location near the ocean is ideal climatically, for a light on-shore breeze is almost always present. During the summer months, June, July, and August, rainfall is sometimes scarce, but during the remainder of the year it becomes an almost daily occurance. This lack of rainfall during the summer sometimes poses problems as we are dependant upon rain for our water supply. However, steps are being taken to alleviate this situation.
- V Description of the Station
  The station is located on low, level ground facing northward to the
  Philippine Sea, height above Mean High Water is approximately 8 feet.
  About 40 yards in back of the station buildings the terrain rises to
  about 50 feet above MHW. Located on the top of this hill is the
  recently constructed Power-signal building. The station is on the
  northern shore of Panay Island, a rather small and somewhat densely
  wooded island, northeast of Catanduanes Island, an island of
  considerable size. There are a few small towns on the island, but


they are some distance from the station. Enclosed are some sketches which may better describe the station. Sketch One shows Panay Island and the station location on it. Sketch Two shows the layout of the station proper. No photographs were available at the unit.

- VI Private Cars
  No need for private autos here, definately do not bring them.
- VII Mail and Supplies
  Our supply frequency, considering our out-of-the-way location, is very good. Mail, movies, and light supplies are brought in at least every two weeks. Bi-monthly larger supplies, etc. are brought in by Coast Guard vessel. There is no air strip on the island, therefore water landings are necessary, but this in no way affects our supply frequency.
- VIII Medical
  We have, at present, a Hospital Corpsman First Class who handles
  all of our medical needs of a minor nature. Our sickbay is ample
  and well-equiped. There is a doctor in a nearby town; however, he
  is not always in and his equipment is limited. If the need should
  arise for major medical treatment the CG Air Detachment at Sangley
  Point would fly the patient out. The station is one hour and fourty
  minutes from Sangley Point by air.
- IX Natives
  There are a number of natives on the island; they are either farmers or fisherman, are honest, reasonably intelligent, and friendly.
- X Religious Facilities
  Every second Sunday a Roman Catholic Priest visits the station and conducts a Catholic Service aboard.
- XI Lastly, even though the station is isolated, I feel that it can offer a great deal to any man, officer or enlisted, who might be assigned here. One of the really worthwhile things about this duty is that all hands here realize their interdependancy upon one another and real teamwork and a sense of "belonging" result.
